Local Interest goes Nationwide

It has become quite common these days to see on national Television programs that actually feature our local area. More often than not it is in connection with the aqueduct or the Llangollen area. Recently though a BBC Wales production began with a house very dear to the hearts of the people of Trevor and Garth, particularly so if you are a devotee of Trevor Church's Harvest Suppers. I refer, of course, to Laurence Llewelyn-Bowen's "Hidden Houses of Wales" that featured Trevor Hall. The house's connection with J C Edwards, the canal and railway were explored in the programme, as were local names, which leads me on to an article that appeared in "The cefn chronicle" in 1950. I hope you find it interesting. The article, a series of several, was written by a Mr J Watkin Ellis and entitled:

Points of Local Interest

3 Trevor Hall, Plas-yn-Pentre, etc.

TREVOR - Before quoting from Mr Thompson's book, let me make a few observations. The Welsh name for that particular district is "Chwrela" (Quarries) and in former days most Welsh people called it by that name. When the branch railway line from Ruabon to Llangollen was opened for passenger traffic on June 2nd, 1862, Chwrela was the name of the station now called Trevor. ("Chwerla" no doubt should have been spelt **Chwarelau**)

The railway time –table for July 1862 contained the following: Ruabon ... 9-35 a.m. Cefn Mawr ... 9-41 a.m.(afterwards Acrefair) Chwerla ... 9-47 a.m. (afterwards Trevor) Llangollen ...10-00 a.m. I don't know why Trevor was not spelt correctly, "Trefor".

"Between Trevor Hall and the Dee is one of the most beautiful clear springs of cold water imaginable. It is called Ffynnon Yryrog (Oerog) and is in great repute as a bath for the cure of rheumatic affections and if Saint Collen had thought proper to have bestowed his benediction, it might perhaps have rivaled its prototype at Holywell.

"Its issue is very abundant and its coldness exceeds belief. Persons bathing cannot continue in the water a minute. Many wonderful accounts are told of its efficacy in chronic disorders. In its passage to the Dee it used to turn a water mill - now in ruins.

"Near to the River Dee is the ancient house of Plas-yn-Pentre (1634), now inhabited by Mr. Edward Jones.

Pontcysyllte Aqueduct and Canal World Heritage Site Update

Economic Development Department, Wrexham County Borough Council

The breadth of work currently under way is such that there are 6 Sub Groups working on various aspects of the Site's management and development. These groups are - Planning & Landscape, Visitor Management & Economic Regeneration, Conservation & Heritage, Education, Public Transport and finally, Community. The latter Group is the main one for local community group involvement. As reported previously, the first project to have a visible impact in 2010 will be the Green Transport Scheme which will commence in May with a new leaflet on how to access and enjoy the 11-mile site by bus, with the buses and bus stops serving the route badged up with the Pontcysyllte logo. Good progress is being made with additional car park provisions at Chirk (at the former Chirk Estate Office) and at Trevor Basin and we hope this should start to make life much easier for local residents. There are detailed negotiations ongoing with Flexsys/Solutia regarding the future of the Flexsys site and any potential benefit to the World Heritage Site.

Finally, can I take this opportunity to say thank you for all the support myself and my colleague Del Roberts-Jones have had since we started back in 2003 the work to get the Aqueduct inscribed on the World Heritage List. It has been an amazing journey and we have had so much support from the community throughout which gave us so much heart and determination to see it through. We are sorry to be leaving in March, but hope very much that the vision and undoubted economic opportunities which the new World Heritage site has to offer can be fulfilled. The new officer who will continue this work is Karen Whitney-Lang.

A message from Tony Rees, Vicar of Chirk with Froncysyllte.

"Why Good Friday?" I am sometimes asked. "What was good about it?"

On the face of it, actually it was a very bad day. Jesus suffered death by crucifixion: an extremely cruel and degrading form of public execution. Jesus suffered death because of the goodness of his character and life, the honesty of his preaching and teaching, and because of his faith and intimate relationship with God. His enemies hated him for all this. Jesus died asking "My God, why have you forsaken me? All seemed lost.

But an early Christian tradition believed that Jesus died on the cross for our sake, because of us. One strand believed that Jesus died to forgive us: According to Luke 23:34 Jesus said "Father, forgive them, for they do not know what they do" - a verse found only in Luke's gospel, and then not in all the best manuscripts (but nevertheless probably original). Who was being forgiven? The Jews who called for his death? The Romans who crucified him? The disciples who deserted him, denied him, betrayed him? Perhaps as we might have behaved like any of them, Jesus is forgiving us too. I hope so!

Other New Testament writers gave rise to various theories of atonement (ideas to explain how the death of Jesus affects our salvation). Christians have always agreed that the death of Jesus was good for us, even if they cannot agree on how to explain this.

That alone makes it Good Friday.

But what clinches it is Easter Sunday. On Good Friday man did his worst. On Easter Sunday God did his best. By raising Jesus to life again, God is saying "Jesus is my Son. He died because of you, but he is alive because of me. My love, my grace, my forgiveness, is stronger than death. And you too can be alive again because he is alive, if you let him live in you."

And that really makes Good Friday a really good Friday indeed.

Raspberry Brûlées

250b/9 oz Raspberries

- 1 tbsp. lemon juice
- 2 tbsp. raspberry jam
- 6 tbsp. caster sugar
- 1 tsp. vanilla essence

125 ml/4 fl. Oz crème fraîche

125 ml/4 fl. Oz. double cream

lightly whipped

whole raspberries to decorate

Put the raspberries and lemon juice into a saucepan and stir over a low heat for about 5 minutes until they start to soften. Remove from the heat, stir in the jam, then divide between 4 ramekins. Preheat the grill to hot. In a bowl, mix together the crème fraîche, cream and vanilla essence. Spoon the mixture over the raspberries and level the surfaces. Sprinkle the caster sugar over the top, allowing $1\frac{1}{2}$ tablespoons per ramekin. Cook under the preheated grill, as close to the flames or element as possible, for 2-3 minutes, until the sugar caramelizes. Remove from the grill, decorate with whole raspberries and serve immediately. Alternatively to serve chilled, leave to cool at room temperature, then cover with clingfilm and place in a refrigerator to chill for 3-4 hours.

Police Matters

Hopefully when you read this community newsletter Spring will be approaching and the bad weather behind us. At community meetings and from talking to residents in the area we get an impression of what the residents of Llangollen Rural feel are the important local issues you want to be addressed by the Police . I would encourage you to express your views to myself or if you are on the internet by visiting the North Wales Police web site where you can have your say with "balanceyourbobbies".

What is it?

Balance your Bobbies is a fresh and innovative way for North Wales Police to engage with you to find out what your priorities are. Balance Your Bobbies invites you to assign police resources based on your perception of neighbourhood issues.

What are the benefits?

Identifying what local community priorities and concerns really are.

Improve public confidence by directly responding to your views.

Increase public involvement in policing.

Allows the District Inspector a direct channel to direct resources.

How does it work?

The first section of the page has an area or post code selection. When the user has filled in the correct details and clicked on the "Find My Team" button, the associated Policing Team details will be displayed. You are then free to proceed with the Balancing aspect of the page.

This entails the user moving a graphical slider back and forth along the associated priorities, in 5% increments. As the sliders are moved a graphical representation will be made in real time of the amount or balance the user has allocated in total. Once the user has reached or balanced to 100% or less, you will be able to click on the "submit" button.

You are able to let us know each month so that we are aware of current local priorities which may well change over a period of time. I would encourage you to view the North Wales Police website at least once to see the information available which may be of interest or useful at some point in time.

However this year, in view of the financial climate, it was agreed by your Councillors that no increase to the precept be requested thus slightly reducing the increase in Council Tax that will inevitably be levied.

County Councillor's Diary

This is a brief update of the ongoing issues within the Llangollen Rural Ward. I would like to start by saying what a good year 2009 was, and I hope the success continues this year. We have seen the coming together of our three villages working for the good of their communities. What a wonderful Christmas spirit, with the switch on of the Christmas tree lights, one at Trevor green, one in Garth, and one at Fron Community centre. Once again the visit from Santa around our three villages was a great success, and I would like to express my thanks to Santa and his helpers for all their hard work. The pensioner's party at Trevor Community Centre was once again enjoyed by all who attended. I would like to say a special thanks to all who made it a great success.

Weather: This was exceptional which caused us major problems. I will be asking the council if we can do better this year. Gritting was a problem across the ward with salt bins being stolen, and to make things worse the Welsh Assembly Government stopped the council from refilling the bins, and gritting our footpaths and side roads. They were instructed to keep clear A and B roads and school routes. Maybe we need to look at how we did it in the old days, people designated from each of the villages who were employed by the council to grit and clear the roads when needed. We are now in the process of opening a new salt depot in Chirk, no doubt this will help.

School Transport equalities policy: I held a public meeting in Trevor Community Centre on the 1st February, which was a chance for parents of children who attend Fron & Garth primary Schools, to have their say on how they would be affected if this policy was implemented. It would mean their child would have to attend their nearest secondary school to qualify for free transport, and in our case it would be Ruabon. Parents can still exercise their parental choice, but they would have to pay for the transport. My understanding is that there is no capacity in Ruabon School to take these children at present, so therefore free transport would be provided to Dinas Bran, as that is the next nearest secondary school. Although the weather kept a lot of people away it was very lively, and lots of questions were put to Councillor Aled Roberts and Daffydd Ifans LEA. I asked Community Councillor Elfed Morris if he would chair the meeting as he did not have a Conflict of interest, he did a great job to which I was very grateful.

Trevor Shop: I have spoken to Wrexham Council about the concerns of the community regarding the length of time it has taken to sort out the re-opening of the shop on Trevor Estate. They have assured me that they are dealing with it, with urgency. We also had a lengthy discussion in the Community Council meeting and they have sent a strong letter to Wrexham Council to support my views and of the local residents, for the immediate re-opening of the shop.

Old Railway Line: We are waiting until the weather picks up to complete the project.

Reads Yard Car Parking: The Yard is now cleared and ready for use when the season starts, so I hope it will solve some of our parking problems which we had last year.

New Post Box: I was pleased to see that at last we have had a new post installed by the telephone kiosk at the junction of Llangollen Road/Garth Road. Any problems don't hesitate to contact me.
