Community Centre improves internet skills in the community with free BT broadband

Garth and Trevor Community Centre, Telecottage, based in Trevor is celebrating having been awarded a year's free internet connection through BT Community Connections. The award scheme which is part of BT's Get It Together campaign, offers charitable and community organizations who help, or want to help their local community get on line, the chance to apply for 12 months' free BT broadband.

The judges were impressed by the Community Centre's ideas of how they intend to assist more people in their area to use the internet. Currently the centre has several computers and runs access



sessions on Mondays and first Click Courses on Thursdays, with the Youth Club having access on Wednesdays. These sessions have proved a big hit with those who do not have IT equipment. New weekly sessions, for basic level training for those who do not have much experience using the internet sending emails and shopping on line, started on Thursday 12th. January 2011.

Delwyn Roberts said "We're so pleased to have been recognized by BT Community Connections and the year's free broadband is just fantastic. We have worked hard to establish the telecottage computer access facility. We're really excited about the training sessions and how they will help people, even if it is only helping people keep in touch with old friends or share photographs with family who are far away."

Simon Paul, BT Community Investment Manager, said:"This scheme is an important part of the BT's Get IT Together programme to make the benefits of the internet available to as many organizations as possible. There are still nine million people in the UK who have never used the internet and BT Community Connections is one of the steps that BT is taking to reduce this number and we are really excited about it."

Therefore the box will remain in the ownership of BT who will then consider it's future use or removal.

As this will be my last article as Chairman, I would like to thank the Council for the support they have shown me, and for the Clerk's guidance in my duties. It has been an honour and something I have very much enjoyed.

Concerned about Dog fouling in our area?

You can report an incident direct to the Public Protection Department, Ruabon Offices, High Street, Ruabon, phone 01978 298989.Or phone the Environmental Officers on 07800 688790 or 07753 771711. It will help to have a note of the date, the time and place the incident occurred as well as a description of the offender (if known) and any other relevant information such as colour, size and breed of dog.

Dog owners do you know that failure to pick up after your dog can result in a maximum penalty of £1,000? Fixed penalty notices can be issued to offenders caught allowing their dogs to foul and not removing the waste or failing to dispose of their litter in a correct manner. The fixed penalties are set by the Welsh Assembly. Currently fixed penalties of £75 are routinely issued for dog fouling and littering offences. The fixed penalty notices require payment to be made within 14 days of the notice being received to prevent further action being taken. Failure to pay can result in court procedures Dog fouling carries a maximum penalty of £1,000 and littering including dropping cigarette stubs can incur a penalty of up to £2,500. The Environmental Enforcement Officers carry out frequent patrols of areas within the County Borough in order to catch offenders.

The grass and weeds had taken a good hold of the seating area but with a bit of 'gentle' persuasion they soon came out leaving a nice brickwork floor on show. The stone wall around the end of the 'fork' is now exposed as the weeds have been removed and cut back. The steps and bridge were cleaned of most of the weeds and ivy and litter was also removed.





However, there is still a lot to do in another project scheduled for mid February and again in March. It would be nice to see the canal free of litter as all rubbish ends up here with it being a 'dead end'. We are hoping to tidy up part of the centre area but we are aware that there is a lot of wildlife here.

Blue Tit, Great Tit, Chaffinch, Goldfinch, Robins, Hedge Sparrows, Heron, Nuthatches, Blackbirds, Bullfinch, Great Spotted Woodpecker, Collared Dove, Wood Pigeon, Crows, Magpies, Geese, Starlings, Seagulls, Owls, Buzzards, Coal Tit, Jay & Siskin.

Pineapple Cheesecake

115g/4 oz digestive biscuits, finely crushed	350g/12 oz curd cheese
4 tbsp butter, melted, plus extra for greasing	150ml/5 fl oz dbl cream, whipped
100g/3½ oz caster sugar	400g/14 oz canned pineapple slices, drained and halved pinch of freshly grated nutmeg, to decorate (optional)
Juice of 1 lemon	
2 tbsp grated lemon rind	
350g/12 oz cream cheese	

Put the crushed biscuits into a large bowl and mix in the melted butter. Grease a 20cm/8inch loose bottomed cake tin with butter, then press the biscuit mixture evenly over the base.

Put the sugar into a separate bowl and stir in the lemon juice and the lemon rind. Add the cheeses and beat until thoroughly combined. Fold in the cream. Spread the cream mixture evenly over the biscuit layer. Cover with cling film and place in the refrigerator to chill for at least 4 hours.

Remove the cheesecake from the refrigerator, turn out onto a serving platter and spread the pineapple slices over the top. Sprinkle over a little grated nutmeg, if using. Serve immediately.

A Message for Easter

The cross has been the Christian sign and symbol from the time of Jesus onwards. See a cross, and it declares a Christian presence, be it church or chapel, baptism or blessing.

On Good Friday, Christians remember the crucifixion of Christ. Jesus died on the cross, and that is why it is the Christian sign. Yet the cross was a degrading punishment, a slow torturous death, a demonstration of the harshness and barbarity of the Roman Empire which is so often upheld as a civilisation.

Yet the gospels tell us that Jesus predicted his passion, knew that crucifixion would be the inevitable result of his ministry of healing and preaching. Bad people cannot tolerate the presence of the good, then and now. All the characters round the cross were contributors to the death of Jesus, the Son of God.

For the Gospel writers Mark, Luke, and Matthew, Jesus died a victim of injustice and wickedness and religious bigotry. For the writer of John's Gospel, Jesus died a victor: good triumphing over evil, God triumphing over man, life triumphing over death. All of them are right in their interpretation of the death of Christ. What do you think ?

Here is a little story often told: I once asked Jesus how much he loved me. "This much", he said, and holding wide his arms he died.

Know Christ's love for you, especially on Good Friday.

The River Dee - A Holy River?

At the beginning of the last century the waters of the River Dee were considered so pure that it was used for baptisms.

The river at Pontcysyllte, at a spot known locally as the Grove, was used as a place where baptisms were carried out by the various Chapels in the district. It became so popular that the local people called it the 'Welsh Jordan' and visitors would line the banks of the river to watch baptisms in what would become an annual event.



It is possible that the first baptism was carried out in 1904 and in total 31 people of both sexes were baptised, from local Chapels in Froncysyllte, Garth and Cefn Mawr. During the services, hundreds of people would line the woods on each bank of the river and sing hymns whilst the Minister carried out the ceremony. Those newly baptised would then be taken to a nearby house called Llyn Madoc, after their immersion in the river, and would be provided with hot drinks while they dried off!

An oak tree, thought to be over 600 years old, stood near the place where the baptisms were held and was associated with the Welsh Baptist Chapel at Froncysyllte. Ceremonies were held under its long branches and ministers would preach to large crowds. During the 1930's however the tree was considered to be unsafe and was a danger to those who frequented the area. A large crowd gathered to watch its downfall and it is thought that some of its branches were taken away; some to be used as firewood and some to be carved into souvenirs.

After a very busy end to the year, culminating in a visit from Father Christmas, we have now settled into the new term. The Topics are Winter and Winter weather; the Celebrations we will cover are St Valentine's Day, St David's Day and Mothers Day.

For the last 3 months we have been trialing a new timetable and rota for the children. This has involved making different use of the Nursery areas for the different age groups, the introduction of additional creative activities and a review of the constructive play offered at various times of the day, Feedback from children, staff and parents has been very positive, so we will now be adopting the new system on a 4 weekly basis.

Since the last news letter, the Nursery has been taking part in the Infant Nutrition Programme which has been presented and funded by Wrexham N.H.S. The older children have been taking part in the "Smile" campaign, to promote good dental care. All staff have received training from the Dental Service and the Nursery has been issued with brush buses, large scale teeth models, fun activity packs and resources. The children have all been given a dental health pack to take home and are now busy cleaning their teeth as part of the Nursery daily routine.

Several new children have joined the Nursery during the New Year and are settling in well.

The total increase equates to approx. £2.70 per household per annum.

In short, it compliments what you have always done as a 'Watch' member, but uses modern technology and communications to make life easier and simpler for all involved. It is also interactive allowing you to send any messages back just as easily.

OWL can be signed up for as a community group or as an individual. If you would like an application form please contact myself.

Also, I would encourage residents to complete 'Balance Your Bobbies' which can be found on the North Wales Police website. This can be done monthly and lets us know your current priorities and concerns.
