Fron Male Voice Choir

The tradition of a love for music and singing in communities throughout Wales is to be found in the historical records of the village of Fron from the mid 19th century onwards and as Fron developed into a large village with chapels, church and school, singing became an important feature in its cultural life. In those former times, several small choral groups were active in the village places of worship and school.

Following the bleak and depressing years of World War 11 the inspiration to sustain this long established tradition arose as a result of the inauguration of the International Musical Eisteddfod at Llangollen, which was to exercise considerable influence on the men of all ages in the village. Those of the older generation lead the way and encouraged the village youth club members to join with them in forming the Choir. In addition, it was the desire of returning servicemen to continue the spirit of comradeship they had experienced in service life and re-kindle their former interest in music.

Founded in 1947, Fron Choir was based on the long established choral groups continuing to operate in the village. Starting life on a small scale, it was not realised at that time the brilliant future and achievements which were to be its rewards in later years. This success has been achieved by the commitment of the choristers to hard work and dedication, together with the good fortune in having the leadership of four gifted Musical Directors. Each of its three previous leaders, together with its current Director – Ann Atkinson – has bestowed their considerable musical talent on the Choir, thereby guiding it to the high standards that have been attained.

Sixty years on, the principles on which the Choir were based have not changed, a love of choral music, a desire to entertain a widest possible audience and a spirit of comradeship continue to be its aims

Message from the Vicar of Froncysyllte and Chirk

It is the privilege and responsibility of clergy like me to conduct funerals when required. These will vary in character, even though the official service book is used. Different funerals will get different hymns, Bible readings, prayers, and of course eulogy, as the family sees most fitting.

And different mourners will come with their own memories of the deceased and also different levels of faith to sustain them. And this may well depend on the circumstances of death and age of the deceased. Some will be troubled, some will be at peace with the situation; some will come with confident Christian faith, others with no faith, and most with something in between.

So we approach the annual remembrance of the death of Christ Jesus on Good Friday and his resurrection on Easter Sunday. Those first disciples were shocked at the brutal and untimely death of their Lord (not understanding that it was necessary for the Christ to suffer and die in order to enter into glory), and just as shocked at his apparent disappearance on that first Easter Sunday morning ...until he appeared to them later that day. And even then it was hard to believe that he was alive again after such a public death on the cross. They were not a little confused - and who can blame them? Will you approach Good Friday with the same horror of the disciples and the same question of Jesus "Why?" sharing the pain of Christ, grieving over the sin of the world?

Or will you approach Good Friday believing that Christ hung and died on the cross forgiving us all, and saving us from the effects of sin, and reconciling us to God? Or both?

Will you approach Easter Sunday with the same wonder and incredulity of the disciples ... waiting to be convinced, yet willing to be convinced?

Or will you approach Easter with the joy that Christ is alive for evermore, our living Lord waiting to live in us and make us alive in him, full of faith and hope in life after death with God in heaven? Or both?

And will you attend church or chapel to strengthen or affirm your faith on Good Friday or Easter Sunday or both? You will be very welcome, wherever you are and whoever you are and whatever faith you have, because we are no different from those first disciples who witnessed the death and resurrection of Christ Jesus, expressed despair one day and delight another day, but found him to be their living Lord everyday thereafter.

Seating in Garth – following the Community Council's Risk Assessment Following a recent review of the seating provided in all three communities, a concern was raised as to the positioning of a bench in Garth. The bench is located in a small refuge a little distance down from the school hill, and looks back across the road onto pleasant views of some terraced gardens. The bench has been in place for generations and is viewed as an intrinsic part of the village. The original bench would have been placed when traffic was of a more sedate pace and it would be fair to say that that scenario has changed. The fundamental concern is safety and whether a bench positioned very near to the road, with no pavement or kerb is now the best option, particularly for our older or very young residents who may be unsteady on their feet? We understand there may well be a strong desire to retain the seat but perhaps some thought needs to be put into the best possible solution. This may include rotating the bench to look out onto the fields and valley beyond, and provide some ornamental fencing to part enclose the refuge, and prevent a simple trip or slip into the roadway. We would seek your views on this, and ask for those to be directed to Sue Jones the Clerk to the Community Council by the end of March. I would like to say a big thank you to all those who worked so hard during the year to make these events happen.

Several meetings have been held between myself, Community Councillors, some bus users within the ward, and Wrexham Council bus Transport manager. I am pleased to be able to tell you that a shuttle bus service will commence from Fron, Trevor, Garth, calling at Acrefair, Cefn, Rhosymedre and going through to Ruabon train station, which connects with the scheduled bus service and rail. I have spoken to the proprietor of the bus company and he is prepared to stop anywhere on route, if you indicate. It is due to start on 23rd March and is for a twelve-month trail period. This service will be reviewed after six months, so be warned USE IT OR LOSE IT! Please see inside for the bus time table.

I have been successful in getting an environmental improvement grant, on behalf of the Community Council. Site meetings have been held and we have identified the old station yard as the project that would meet the requirements. To obtain the Tidy Town grant, this project has to have voluntary organisations involved. Once again, Steve Edwards acting on behalf of the Aqueduct Community Association has brought in the Cadbury's Community team to be part of this project. Also working on the project will be Shane Hughes and his team 'Keep Wales Tidy'. This is to start on the 2nd March.
