County Councillor's Diary

This is a brief update of the on going issues within the Llangollen Rural ward. We are still busy with overgrown hedges, grass cutting, roads and footpath sweeping in the three villages, and other issues raised in the last community council meeting.

After many phone calls to Scottish Power, they have agreed to put new fencing around their sub station, off Charles Avenue on the Trevor Estate. This work is due to commence over the next couple of months.

The Council's Parks Department has allocated one and a half bags of Daffodils to each ward, which they will plant. The areas decided upon are Trevor Hall Road Garth, the entrance to the Rhos Y Coed Estate and by Cliff's Café and Richard's garage in Fron. I feel these are suitable green areas for planting.

I recently arranged a visit to the Mayor's Parlour for Garth and Fron School's. Fron School decided to send their school council. The head teacher Mr. Jarvis and I took six pupils on Monday 23rd October, where they were shown around and had refreshments with the Mayor. Still awaiting the final terms and agreements for the Rural Development grant. As promised a public meeting will be held when this information is known.

I recently submitted a letter to the Evening Leader requesting support from our AM's and MP's across North Wales for the Aqueduct's World Heritage status. We now know we have got a slot in 2008 for the application to be considered, as this decision will be made in Westminster and not the Welsh assembly.

I would like to wish everybody in the ward a very merry Christmas and a happy and healthy New Year. Thanking you all for your support during the past year.

Pontcysyllte Aqueduct

A major step towards Pontcysyllte Aqueduct being considered for UNESCO World Heritage Status has been announced. The Minister of Culture, David Lammy, issued a public statement officially naming the next three sites to go forward from the UK to be



considered as World Heritage Sites. He confirmed that the Antonine Wall in Scotland. Pontcysyllte Aqueduct in Wales and the Twin Monastery of England are the UK's Nominations for 2007, 2008 and 2009.

Under the proposals to extend the World Heritage site boundary, both Denbighshire County Council and Oswestry Borough Council have agreed to support the nomination. The site being considered takes in a small section of canal within the Borough of Oswestry, before crossing Chirk Aqueduct and along the canal to Pontcysyllte Aqueduct, it then follows the feeder canal through to the Horseshoe Falls in Llangollen.

Isobel Garner, Chief Executive, stated "Gaining World Heritage Status would be of great value to the local community as well as a real coup for the tourism profile of the area".

British Waterways Wales & Border Counties Manager Julie Sharman said "Being considered for World Heritage Status is a major accolade, particularly for an area that is so rich in history and heritage".

Froncysyllte Male Voice Choir Part Three

Following the retirement of John, the Choir appointed a new Conductor Val Jones a music teacher from Berriew, Powys. The Choir continued their high standard with a win at Llangollen in 1994 and tours to San Sebastion in Northern Spain, Germany, Holland, Canada, Chicago and Wisconsin. Excellent wins at International Music Festivals in Malta and Athens. After a successful 11 years Val retired.

The present Conductor Ann Atkinson from Corwen was appointed in 2002.

Ann trained as a teacher and operatic singer. With Ann, the Choir won at the Limburg Music Festival, Germany and had a successful tour to Barcelona. The Choir is fortunate in having Owen M. Roberts the local music teacher from Trevor as Sub-Conductor, and Accompanist Alwena Nutting.

The Choir ladies Committee are always working hard in the background organising fund raising events and have contributed over many years to the success of the Choir. The Choir has touched most families in this area and brought much happiness to them all and they in turn have been very supportive of the Choir. There is no better proof of the enjoyment of being in the Fron Choir than the fact that so many Choristers have long service and there are even five founder members still singing. The Choir has made many friends throughout the World and that is exactly why the Choir was formed to reach out in song to other Nations.

Message from Rev. Andrew Sully, Vicar of Llangollen

Something that struck me as unique about Llangollen long before I moved here was the variety of transport that connect with our town - I first passed through the town when walking the Offa's Dyke path some years ago and since then I have come to enjoy the canal, the railway as well as becoming familiar with the extraordinary Horseshoe Pass road. I'm quite a keen cyclist and have began to explore the lanes which rise out of the town - is there a more breathtaking ride than that along the Panorama, I wonder? I could go on - I've not mentioned those who know the Dee from traversing its rapids in a cance or of those who have risen out of the town in a hot-air balloon during the September festival.

Despite the many churches that fill our town, Christians are best understood as people on a journey; people of the Way; as travellers and pilgrims. We may use a variety of means of transport to help us on that journey, but we travel the same route, and use the same map to help us find our way. Whether

we prefer to travel by vintage car, by horseback or scooter we must cross the same terrain, some of it scenic and breath-taking, some inhospitable and arduous. At times we'll wish we'd not started out on the journey at all but had stayed in the safety of our comfortable homes.

The challenge facing the churches today is to provide the appropriate vehicles for those who wish to set out on the Way. What may have worked once may not be what's needed today. Vintage cars, barges and trains are fun in their way, but they are neither the fastest nor the only means of transport in today's world of rapid travel. The wisest churches are those who genuinely try to marry the needs and pressures of today's world with means of travel that fit and connect. This translates into finding the words and methods of coming into contact with the Way of lesus that is appropriate for today. This means a varied diet of worship and prayer that feeds all generations and tastes. The rainbow reminds us that variety and diversity lie at the very heart of God and that God delights in our difference, so long as we remain committed to travelling together.


