Memories of Trevor Wharf

We start with **Rose Cottage**; this was the only dwelling in the Trevor Wharf, that boasted of having a bathroom en suite and in my time was tenanted by Mr & Mrs Jonathon Evans along with their children Emlyn, Blodwen, Howel, Helen and Betty. They were a musical family as Jonathon was a pianist, Emlyn was a noted tenor and generally all were above average singers. Helen later became the wife of a South Wales Cleric and settled down there.

Next came the **Wharf Public House**; the pub ceased trading in the early 1900's and reverted to a cottage to be known as **No 7 Canal side**. The first tenant of No 7 was my Grandmother Jane Evans who previously had before my Grandfather died, lived in Pen Y Graig, Bont a tied house owned by the Canal Company. My Grandfather Enoch Evans was a banks man for the Canal Company and had relocated to Bont from the Ellesmere Depot to cover the company owned embankment from the Aqueduct to Bryn Howell being responsible for keeping the grass, brambles and other weeds down. He was also along with Mr B. Davies the Fron – Whitehurst banks man, responsible for keeping the Aqueduct trough ice free during the Winter. If Grandfather needed additional help for one reason or another he contacted his supervisor in Ellesmere who would assess the situation and if needed would send out a gang from Ellesmere.

On Grandfather's death his job was given to his son Jack who was later dubbed 'Jack the Bont' and became a bit of a legend in his own right. It was at this time my Grandmother was offered the tenancy of No 7 and Jack the tenancy of Pen y Graig. Joining Gran at No 7 were children Sam, Gwyn, Noel, Elsie and Gladys. Her other children Cissie, Maggie, Rose and Chrissie were away working or married in 1924. I was to become the junior member of the household to be brought up by my Grandmother.

Lemon & Almond Drizzle Cake

100g (3½ ozs) Marg2 large eggs150g (5½ ozs) Castor Sugar60ml (4 tbsp) milk175g (6 ozs) S.R. Flour1 lemon5ml (1 tsp) Baking Powder25g (1 oz) flake almonds100g (3½ ozs) Gran. Sugar25g (1 oz) flake almonds

Preheat oven to 180c, 350g, and gas 4. Grease and line base of 2lb loaf tin. Place marg, castor sugar, baking powder, flour, eggs and milk into a large bowl and beat well for two minutes until light and fluffy. Add grated rind of the lemon. Place into tin, level and sprinkle with almonds. Bake for 40 – 45 minutes until the cake springs back from side of tin.

While the cake is baking mix together the granulated sugar and lemon juice, spoon the lemon mixture over the top of the cake as soon as it comes out of the oven. Leave to cool in the tin.

Chairman's Corner

Several meetings have been arranged with organisations that will be able to help us achieve our aims.

The community café in Fron is going from strength to strength and continues to be really well supported by both visitors and villagers alike, the money raised is going to be put towards improvement projects in the village, and it is our intention to apply for support grants using the money raised to help with the match funding and make the money go further!.

PC Gary Robershaw & PCSO Dave Jenkins have been working hard in the villages and have carried out a number of speed surveys in specific areas of concern that have been raised by your community councillors. The results from these surveys will be fed back in the next council meeting. Gary has also given a report of his findings in Garth in this newsletter. The villagers of Fron have also presented a well supported petition asking for action to be taken with regards the issue of speeding traffic through village along the A5, this is now being presented to the Welsh Assembley Government who have responsibility for this trunk road.

I would like to thank every one involved in making the 'fun day' in Trevor such a huge success, the number of visitors far exceeded expectations and I know the community stall holders were really pleased with the opportunity to 'boost their coffers'. I was helping out on the Cakes & Company stall and it was great to see so many people enjoying themselves.

The community celebrated the very best gardens in our villages in the newly refurbished Garth & Trevor Community Centre, with the annual best kept garden competition, the standard was extremely high and made the judges task of choosing winners really difficult, but win or lose the fact that our neighbours make such an effort in creating such beautiful gardens which bring pleasure and joy to all those that pass them. A special note of thanks should also be extended to our Clerk Sue Jones for organising the event.

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Message from the Vicar of Froncysyllte & Chirk Christianity at Canterbury

The recent Lambeth Conference of Anglican bishops worldwide brought to the world's attention the divisions that exist in Christianity about the place of the Bible as a basis of faith, especially with reference to what should be the Christian attitude towards homosexuality.

Over a quarter of the bishops failed to attend the Lambeth Conference: they were mostly from Africa, Asia and South America. They hold traditionalist views about everything, not just homosexuality, and regard the Bible as the sole basis for the Christian faith, like old fashioned Protestants.

They stayed away primarily because they disagreed with a liberal, indeed approach to homosexuality, but in fact they disagree with a liberal, indeed the Anglican approach to Christianity generally. Protestants base their Christian faith solely on the Bible, Roman Catholics have not only the Bible but more important the Pope and the authority of the Church (remember it was the Church that produced the Bible, so which has greater authority?). But Anglicans derive their Christian faith from the Bible, the Church, Reason and Experience: the Bible as the basis of faith (but not fundamentalism), the Church (its bishops, creeds and doctrines, etc.) as the interpreter of the faith (but not infallible popery), Reason to explain and understand the faith (but not rationalism), and finally Experience to test and apply the faith (but not eccentricity). Authentic Anglicans hold all four elements in careful balance when formulating and pronouncing on the Christian faith.

So where do you get your faith from? Christians have the Bible, the Church, Reason and Experience. We also have the examples of the saints (both the famous ones and the ordinary ones), we have the inspiration and guidance of God's Holy Spirit, and we have, above all, the character of Christ Jesus as known in the gospels and imagined by each believer.

And my personal understanding of Jesus is that he was a liberal by inclination (he was certainly a liberal Jew!), a man of great compassion and courage, faith and vision. I will not be rash enough to suggest that he would be an Anglican (!) but I will suggest that his known character would have found him at the Lambeth Conference rather than deliberately absent from it. At the end of the day, Christians must show the character of Christ, but we will all differ in our understanding of that character and in our efforts to copy that character. Everything else is secondary. As Sir Herbert Butterfield, the mid-twentieth century British historian famously said: "Hold fast to Christ, and for the rest be totally uncommitted".

In what is becoming an annual tradition, the family fun day was held at Trevor Basin adjacent to Pontcysyllte Aqueduct on Saturday August 2nd.

There were a whole range of activities and stalls to enjoy including fairground rides, face-painting, wildlife displays and entertainment from Gary Sausage and Punch and Judy. Given the setting there were also exhibitions and demonstrations of traditional canal crafts such as bonnet making, boatmen's spiderweb belts, painting and crochet and rag rug making. Many local community groups had displays and stalls. The local angling society also ran their popular competition "Guess the Weight of the Trout" which weighed in at 7lbs 2oz and 8 grams.

Event organiser Kay Rickard from Wrexham County Borough Council's Economic Development Department says "The event has proved very popular over the last two years and has attracted thousands of visitors. We are delighted with the support from the local community and site owners British Waterways. The event appeals to local residents and tourists alike so we love to see lots of people having a great time and enjoying the marvellous setting."

If all goes well during that visit then Pontcysyllte Aqueduct will join the ranks of other global landmarks such as Sydney Opera House, the Taj Mahal and the Tower of London.



Many of you will be aware that Dave Jenkins and I hold monthly meetings with residents of Llangollen Rural. These meetings are all about us listening to your concerns. At a recent meeting those present stated that one issue affecting the quality of lives for those living in the area was of speeding motorists. I am not going to give you a long speech about speeding as I think that has already been done in the past. But, what I will say is that as much as people do not like speed cameras residents still complain about the speed of some vehicles, particularly those traveling along the A5 and A539.

One other area of concern was along Garth road. We recently carried out a speed survey along this stretch and found during two periods on a Sunday, 133 vehicles traveled along the route. Of this only one vehicle was found to be speeding with the average speed being 20.90mph.

Whilst residents are still complaining about speeding issues we will continue to utilize the speed gun and cameras in your area. Don't get caught. Driving at the correct speed may not only save a life but also save you money.
